

Ethics in the Care of People with Dementia

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Alzheimer's disease and related dementias gradually threaten one's autonomy. However, an individual's desire to remain independent may conflict with one's need for safety, especially if insight and judgment are impaired. Trying to determine what is right or wrong in a given situation may problematic, creating ethical dilemmas for all concerned. This session will describe ethics within the context of dementia, highlight tools for ethical decision-making and illustrate ethical principles through a number of case examples commonly seen among those living with dementia.
